ITINERARY:

We will begin our adventure from your hotel in Lima, picking you up for a journey through the historic heart of the city. Our first stop will be Plaza San Martín, where the impressive Gran Hotel Bolívar stands, a symbol of elegance and tradition. Its neocolonial architecture and connection to key moments in Peru's republican history reflect the splendor of an era that helped shape the nation's identity.

From here, we will walk through the old streets of the historic center toward Plaza Mayor, Lima's foundational heart, where we will admire three architectural gems: the Government Palace, the Archbishop's Palace, and the majestic Cathedral of Lima, each holding centuries of history and symbolic value.

Next, we will visit the Monastery of San Francisco, famous for its baroque architecture and mysterious catacombs that reveal fascinating aspects of life and death during the colonial period, offering a true journey into Lima's past.

We will end our tour at the historic Church of Santo Domingo, one of the oldest and most important temples in Peru, which houses precious relics and preserves a deep connection with the Dominican Order.

At the end of the tour, we will return to your hotel so you can rest after experiencing a city that vibrates between the splendor of its past and the vitality of its present.



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Surrounded by elegant neocolonial-style buildings, including the historic

Gran Hotel Bolívar, it reflects the city's splendor and modernization in

the early 20th century. At its center stands the impressive equestrian

statue of San Martín, symbolizing Peru's independence. Today, the

square is part of Lima's Historic Center, a UNESCO World Heritage Site,

and remains a vibrant cultural, historical, and tourist meeting point that

captures the essence of the "City of Kings."



The Main Square of Lima

The Main Square of Lima, also known as the Plaza de Armas, is where Francisco Pizarro founded the city in 1535, making it the political and religious heart of the former Viceroyalty of Peru. Surrounding the square are the Government Palace, the Cathedral of Lima, the Archbishop's Palace, and the Municipal Palace, all reflecting centuries of history and power. At its center stands a bronze fountain dating back to 1651, one of the oldest in South America. Today, as part of Lima's Historic Center, declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site, it remains a proud symbol of the city's identity and tradition.





The Monastery of San Francisco

The Monastery of San Francisco in Lima is one of the most important colonial art landmarks in the country. It stands out for its large church, its cloisters decorated with tiles, its ancient library, and its catacombs. Inside, you can find valuable paintings and a unique Last Supper mural with Andean elements. Located in Lima's Historic Center, it invites visitors to explore the history and art of the viceregal era.



Church of Santo Domingo

The Church and Convent of Santo Domingo of Lima, built shortly after the city's founding in 1535, is one of the oldest and most representative temples in Peru. It stands out for its impressive 40-meter tower, its architecture blending Renaissance, Baroque, and Neoclassical styles, and its beautiful cloisters adorned with Sevillian tiles. Inside lie the remains of Saint Rose of Lima, Saint Martin de Porres, and Saint John Macías, the country's patron saints. As part of Lima's Historic Center, declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site, it remains an enduring symbol of faith, art, and viceregal tradition.
