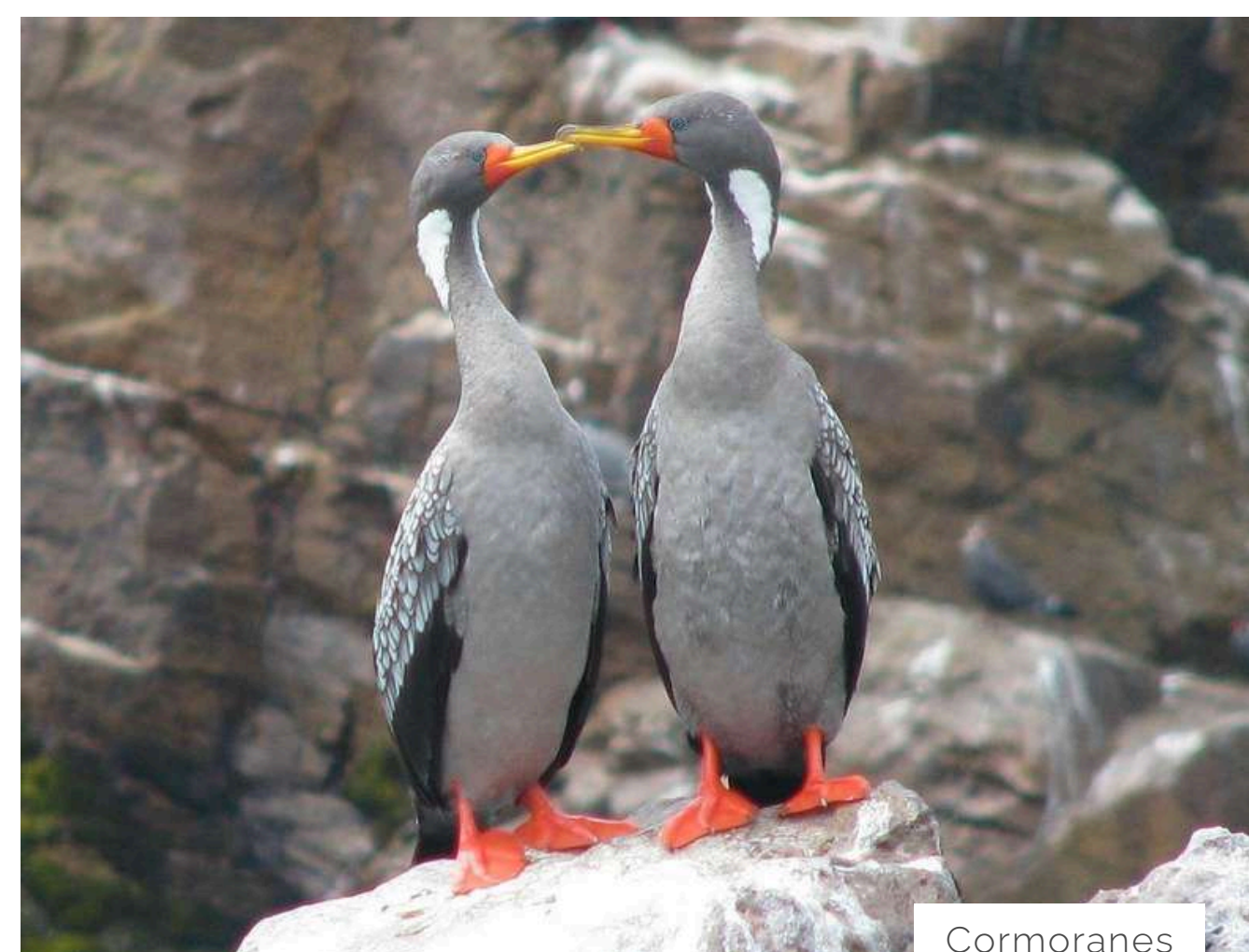
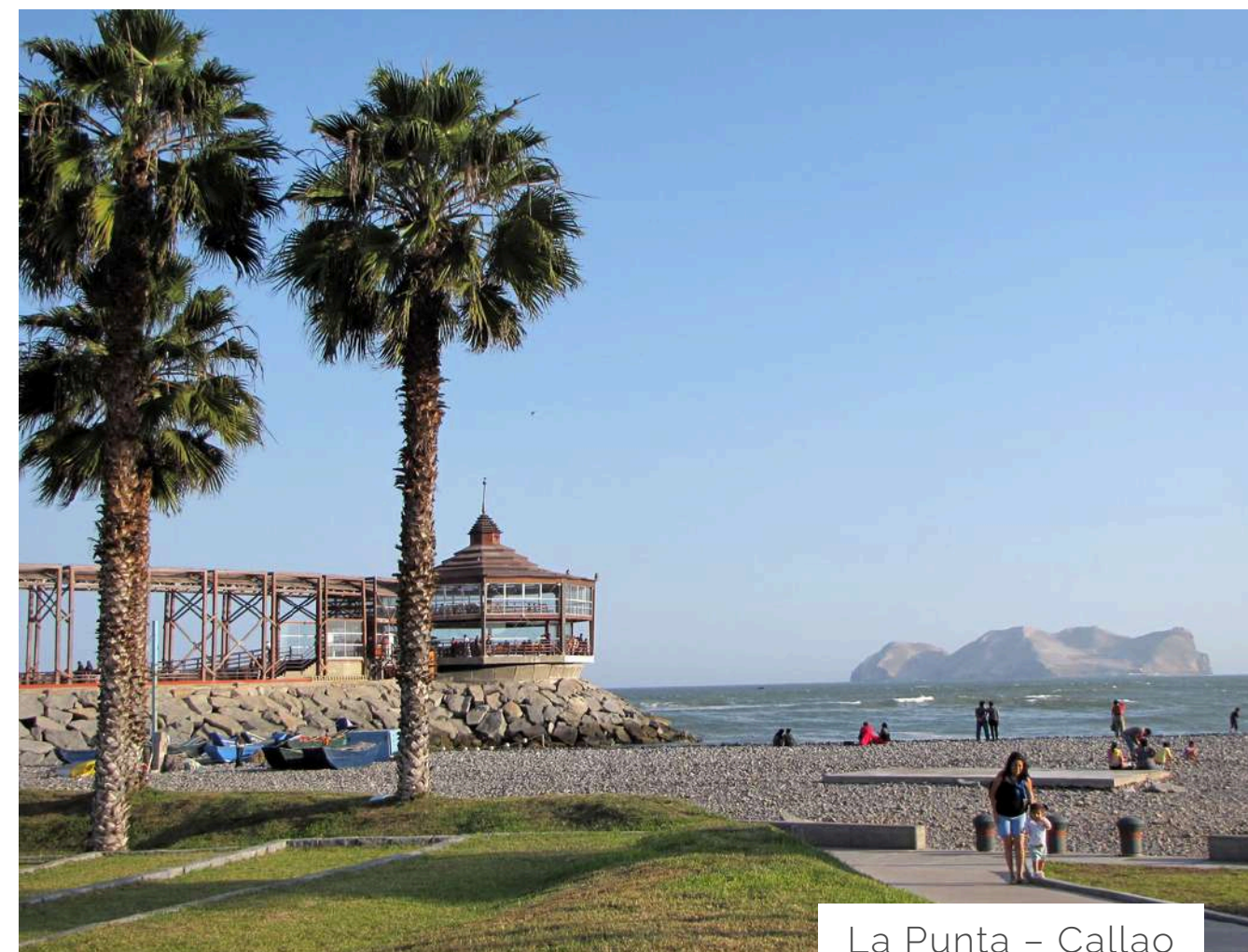
ITINERARY:

In the morning, we will pick you up from your hotel and take you to the district of La Punta in Callao, where our marine adventure begins. After a short walk to the pier, we will board the boat that will take us to explore the islands along the coast. During the ride, we'll see unique rock formations, local fishermen at work, and the submerged area of El Camotal, a former Callao neighborhood now underwater.

We will continue toward San Lorenzo Island, known as the "mysterious island," famous for its stories of naval battles and pre-Inca archaeological remains. We'll then head to El Frontón Island, recognized for the ruins of its former high-security prison. Next, we will visit the Cavinzas Islands, a natural sanctuary with sea caves that host guano birds, pelicans, and a small colony of Humboldt penguins.

Finally, we'll arrive at the Palomino Islands, home to more than 8,000 sea lions. We will approach the colony, and those who wish may swim with these curious animals using wetsuits. At the end of the tour, we will return to the port and then take you back to your hotel.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- Wear light, comfortable, quick-drying clothes if you plan to swim.
- Bring a windbreaker or waterproof jacket to protect yourself from the sea breeze and splashes.
- Put on your swimsuit before the tour if you're going to swim with the sea lions.
- Bring a change of dry clothes for after the trip.
- Protect your camera or phone with a waterproof case.
- If you get seasick easily, take a motion sickness pill about 30 minutes before boarding.

The Peruvian pelicans

The Peruvian pelicans are the most iconic inhabitants of the Palomino Islands. They glide gracefully across the sky in groups, soaring over the sea before diving to catch their food. Sharing this natural refuge with cormorants, boobies, Inca terns, and seagulls, they fill the rocky cliffs with life and movement. Each species plays a vital role in maintaining the balance of the marine ecosystem, creating a breathtaking natural spectacle of flight, sound, and color along the Pacific coast.

The South American sea lions

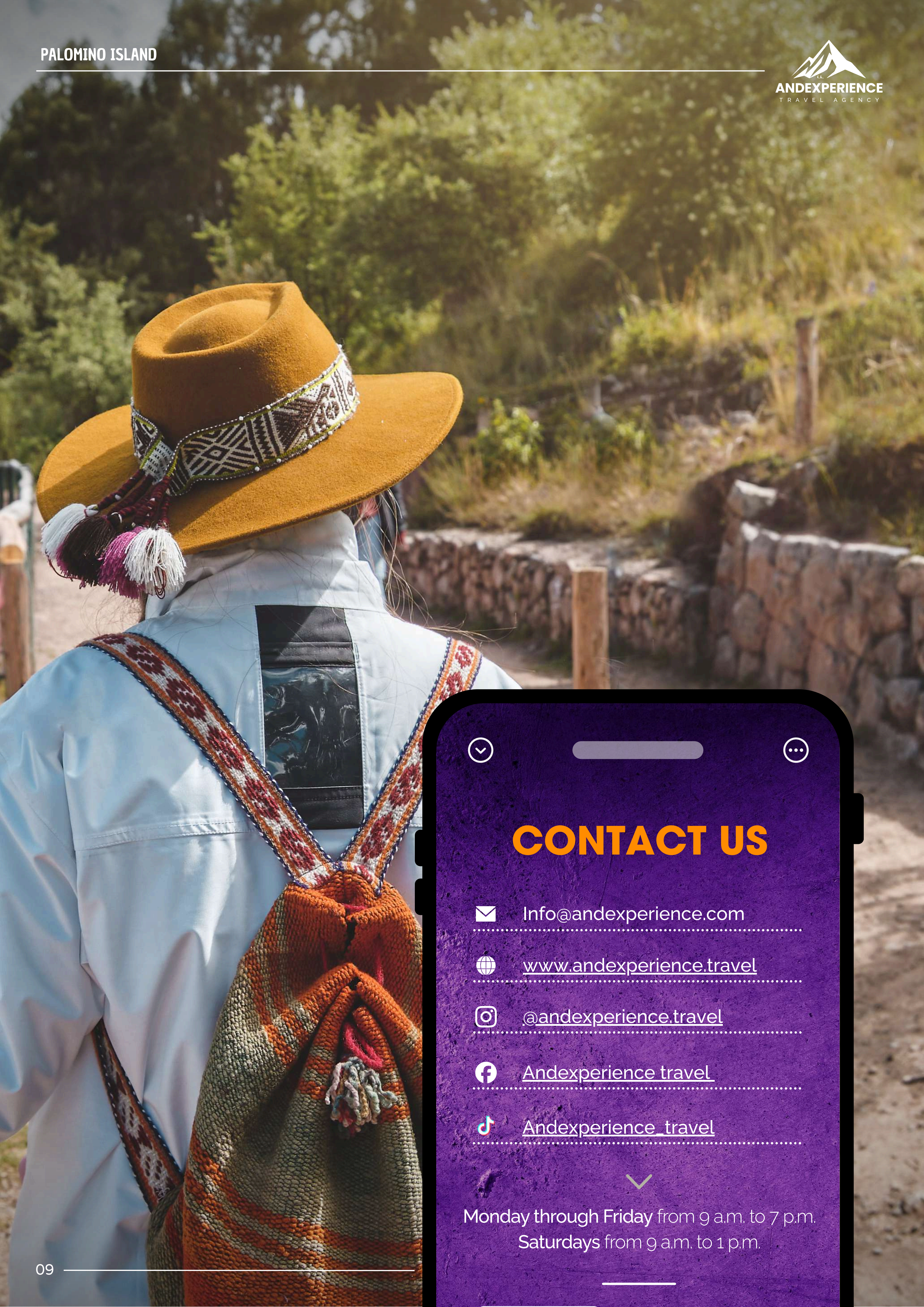
The South American sea lions are the main stars of the Palomino Islands, home to one of the largest colonies in Peru. These charismatic mammals rest and play on the rocks, while others swim freely in the ocean, often approaching visitors with playful curiosity. The males stand out for their impressive manes, while the females care for their pups in calmer areas. Swimming near them is a unique experience that reveals the energy, vitality, and natural beauty that define this marine paradise off the coast of Callao.

The guanay cormorants

The guanay cormorants, with their dark plumage and graceful flight, nest along the cliffs and dive skillfully to catch fish. Humboldt penguins

They feed on fish found in the cold Humboldt Current, which brings life to the sea. Watching them sunbathe or swim gracefully is a unique experience and a beautiful reminder of the rich natural diversity found along the coast of Callao.

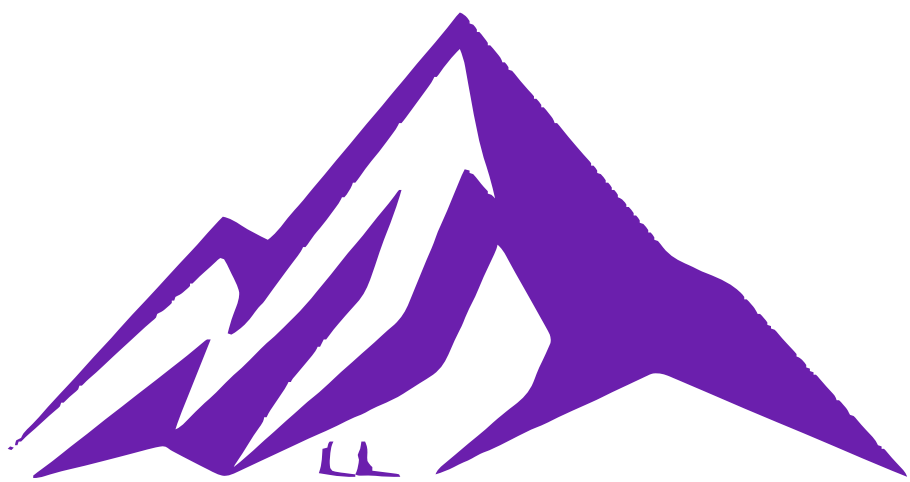
